







# Q9: Think about how often you attend church, the relationships you have with other members there, the role(s) you play in the congregation. How connected do you feel to your congregation?



#### Q11. What benefits do these connections have for your family?

#### Key Highlights:

**Community and Belonging** - The most prominent theme is the deep sense of community and belonging that church connections provide. Families repeatedly mention feeling "known," having a "place to belong," and being part of "something larger than our family unit." This extends to feeling like the congregation is an "extended family" or "second family."

**Support Systems** - A major theme is the comprehensive support network churches provide - emotional, spiritual, physical, and practical support during both crises and celebrations. Many mention help during illness, surgeries, births, deaths, and other life transitions through meals, childcare, prayer, and presence.

**Intergenerational Relationships** - Families highly value the multi-generational connections their children develop with older adults beyond grandparents, creating mentorship opportunities and broader perspectives. This is especially meaningful for families living far from extended family.

**Children's Development** - Parents consistently emphasize how church connections benefit their children through friendships with peers who share similar values, positive adult role models, faith formation opportunities, and exposure to diverse people they wouldn't otherwise meet.

**Friendships and Social Connection** - Many note that their closest friendships have developed through church, providing social opportunities and reducing isolation. This includes both peer friendships for adults and children's friendships that extend beyond school networks.

**Shared Values and Faith Formation** - Families appreciate being surrounded by others who share their core Christian values and can support their family's spiritual growth and faith journey together.

**Service and Purpose** - The opportunity to serve others and be part of something meaningful beyond themselves gives families a sense of purpose and models service for children.

**Stability and Security** - Church connections provide emotional stability and security - knowing there are people who care and will be there when needed, creating a reliable foundation for family life.

#### Key Highlights:

**Community and Relationships** - The most dominant theme is the deep value placed on genuine relationships and close-knit community. People repeatedly mention friendships, intergenerational connections, feeling like family, and knowing each other by name. Many appreciate the small size that allows for personal connections and the sense that everyone matters.

**Welcoming and Inclusive Nature** - A second major theme is openness and acceptance. Congregants highly value churches that are welcoming to all people, including specific mentions of LGBTQ+ affirmation, racial diversity, and creating space for different perspectives and questions without judgment.

**Children and Youth Focus** - There's strong emphasis on children's involvement and faith formation. Many responses highlight quality children's ministries, youth programs, and the meaningful ways children are included as active participants in worship rather than sidelined.

**Service and Social Justice** - Community outreach and social justice work appears frequently, with people valuing congregations that serve their broader communities, engage with peace and justice issues, and demonstrate care for others without ulterior motives.

**Music and Worship** - Musical traditions, particularly four-part harmony singing, and meaningful worship experiences are consistently mentioned as valued aspects of congregational life.

**Support and Care** - People deeply appreciate the practical support their congregations provide during difficult times, the willingness to help when needed, and the genuine care demonstrated in concrete ways.

**Faith Formation and Biblical Teaching** - Many value opportunities for spiritual growth, quality Bible study, thoughtful theology, and space for questions and spiritual exploration within their faith tradition.

**Authenticity and Genuineness** - Throughout the responses, there's appreciation for authentic relationships and people who are genuine rather than superficial in their faith and interactions.

#### Key Highlights:

**Children and Youth Programming** - The most frequent concern is the need for more children and youth in the congregation, along with stronger programming for them. Many mention wanting more kids for their children to interact with, dedicated children's ministers, youth groups, and better Sunday school curriculum. Parents also seek more support during worship services and age-appropriate spiritual formation resources.

**Adult Fellowship and Connection** - Members consistently express wanting deeper relationships beyond Sunday mornings. This includes small groups, informal fellowship opportunities, accountability partnerships, and ways to connect with peers in similar life stages. Many feel isolated and crave more meaningful social connections throughout the week.

**Intergenerational Engagement** - There's a strong desire for better integration across age groups, with many wanting their children to have relationships with trusted adults in the congregation and more opportunities for different generations to learn from each other.

**Spiritual Growth and Education** - Members want more Bible study opportunities, adult education outside business hours, spiritual mentorship, and deeper engagement with faith development. Some specifically mention wanting more theological discussion and accountability in spiritual practices.







Several prominent themes emerge about why families attend church:

**Community and Relationships** - The most frequently mentioned reason centers on building connections with others who share similar faith and values. Families consistently emphasize wanting their children to be part of a broader "church family" beyond their immediate relatives, with trusted adults and peers who can provide support, guidance, and lifelong friendships.

**Faith Formation and Development** - Parents overwhelmingly want to provide their children with a foundation in Christian faith, helping them develop their own relationship with God and Jesus. Many mention wanting to pass on what has been meaningful in their own spiritual journey and give children the tools to make their own faith decisions as they mature.

**Worship and Learning Together** - Corporate worship - singing, praising, and learning about God's word collectively - appears as a central theme. Families value the experience of worshiping as part of something larger than themselves and appreciate the structured learning opportunities that come through Sunday school, sermons, and Bible study.

**Values and Moral Foundation** - Many parents see church as essential for instilling Christian values, ethics, and a moral compass. They want their children to learn principles like service, peacemaking, justice, and caring for others within a supportive faith context.

**Support During Life's Challenges** - Families frequently mention the importance of having a faith community to lean on during difficult times - providing encouragement, comfort, and practical support when facing loss, tragedy, or other hardships.

**Modeling and Routine** - Parents emphasize the importance of modeling faithful living for their children and establishing regular spiritual practices. They see consistent church attendance as creating healthy rhythms and demonstrating that faith is a priority worth dedicating time to each week.

#### **Intergenerational Connection**

Many responses highlight the value of children interacting with people of all ages, learning from elders, and being part of a multigenerational community that provides different perspectives and wisdom.

#### Common themes:

#### "Other" descriptions:

Our family has been trying to make faith development a priority in the last year and particularly in the last 6 months. We are gaining comfort with the environment and learning as much as we can. We do struggle to make time at home for faith development but do our best to make it to church, Sunday School, or both each week. We are also trying to make it a priority to visit & help my grandparents often on the weekends, w hours away, as my grandma has severe dementia and my grandpa needs some respite. Since that is another priority we sometimes are having inconsistent attendance the past couple months.

My children are bombarded with competing and contradictory ideas and values everywhere they turn - some of which don't align with our beliefs. Their friends, social media, and even teachers present worldviews that challenge them or that they don't have the context for. I'm trying to help them navigate these influences and discern what feels the truest to what God is calling them to in their relationships and in their lives.

We've had variable church attendance over the past year, and wish we could be there more often. We feel the value of going to church when we can make it there, which reinforces our interest to go.

I did a better job when the kids were smaller. Now that they are older, it is hard to know if I should insist on them going to church or allow them to not attend.

I'm the grandparent. The families are busy. They are consistent in attending. They are influencing their children by their example. I influence the parents and grands as much as I can!

Opportunities for faith development are everywhere and cannot be contained just at church. We struggle to attend church regularly because of health limits and the need for deep rest on the weekends to make it possible for the kids and my husband to attend school and work during the week. 

### Q25: Which adults do the children in your household typically attend church services with? (Select all that apply)



#### Common themes:

**Travel and Being Out of Town** - This is by far the most frequently mentioned reason - family trips, vacations, visiting relatives, camping, and weekend getaways consistently pull families away from regular attendance.

**Health and Energy Issues** - Many families cite illness, exhaustion from busy weeks, and the need for rest and recovery time. Parents mention being worn out from work demands, kids being too tired, and needing "slow mornings" to recharge.

**Scheduling Conflicts and Competing Activities** - Sports commitments, birthday parties, family gatherings, and other weekend activities create regular conflicts. Many note that Sunday is their only "free day" for household tasks like grocery shopping, laundry, and yard work.



### Q28: Outside of church, does your family engage in the following activities? (select all that apply)



### Q29: Thinking of these faith-related activities outside of church, do you do these as often as you would like?







**Visual Appeal and Quality** - Multiple respondents emphasized the importance of good illustrations, eye-catching graphics, and visually appealing materials. There's a strong desire for high-quality artwork, good paper quality, and appealing bindings that will engage children.

**Age-Appropriate Content and Format** - Parents want materials that are appropriately sized and formatted for different age groups. Several mentioned that full storybook Bibles can be overwhelming for younger children, preferring shorter, more approachable individual books or series.

**Diversity and Representation** - Respondents value materials that show variety in people and cultures, with racially and ethnically accurate depictions. The diversity in posters, handouts, and books was specifically praised.

**Practical Application** - There's a strong theme around connecting biblical stories and faith teachings to everyday life in age-appropriate ways. Parents want materials that help children understand how faith applies to their daily experiences.

**Clear Scripture Connections** - Several respondents emphasized wanting clear connections to specific scriptures or verses, particularly on take-home materials, so parents can understand and reinforce what was taught.

**Engaging and Interactive Elements** - Many mentioned the importance of materials being action-oriented, engaging for middle schoolers, and including follow-up activities and crafts. Music was specifically highlighted as something children love.

**Quality of Content** - Parents want well-written materials that convey messages in realistic, interesting ways rather than being "preachy" or heavy-handedly moralistic. The content should reflect their values while being appealing to children.

Many respondents found it difficult to rank the previous list of elements because they view them as equally important and interconnected.


